INSIGHT EXCHANGE

Launched in November 2017, Insight Exchange was designed by Domestic Violence Service Management (DVSM), in collaboration with Dr Linda Coates and Dr Allan Wade from Centre for Response-Based Practice, Canada. Insight Exchange has been established, developed and is governed by Domestic Violence Service Management (DVSM) a registered charity (ABN 26 165 400 635).

Insight Exchange has been sustained through the generous donations of individuals and a silent donor for the benefit of many.

The Insight Exchange team work together to share insights, apply ideas and evolve resources across contexts.





Insight Exchange acknowledges the Traditional Custodians of the land on which our work and services operate and pay our respects to Elders past and present. We extend this respect to all First Nations peoples across the country and the world. We acknowledge that sovereignty of this land was never ceded. Always was, always will be Aboriginal land.

The purpose of this document

This Insight Exchange Strategic Framework sets the vision, purpose, scope, inputs, outputs, outcomes and accountabilities for the Insight Exchange work. It is published on the Strategy and Engagement landing page on the Insight Exchange website and shared with stakeholders.

In complement, the **Insight Exchange team lead** and implement a work plan (hosted offline) which outlines at a detailed operational level the end to end tasks required to design, develop and review the outputs outlined in the Strategic Framework.

The work of Insight Exchange maps into the overall **DVSM Constitution**.



Insight Exchange is for all people. Insight Exchange respects the diversity of all sexualities and gender identities including but not limited to: lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, intersex, queer and asexual + identities as well as heterosexual and cisgender identities.

Our shared challenge

Violence against women is in every country and culture, causing harm to millions of women and their families. United Nations Women estimates that globally, almost one in three women have been subjected to physical and/or sexual intimate partner violence (IPV), non-partner sexual violence, or both, at least once in their life. (World Health Organisation 2021).

In Australia, domestic and family violence is in every postcode and community.

Our shared responsibility

Preventing violence, understanding violence and improving responses to violence remains a cross cutting national issue and a shared challenge that no community, sector or system can achieve alone.

Every response matters. Any time. Every time. Every person and any community.


<u>Insight Exchange</u> exists to share in this challenge; to continuously learn, reflect and improve on how we contribute to safe, just, effective and dignified responses.

Who benefits from the status quo?

Violence and abuse costs us all. Lives are lost. Homicide. Femicide. Filicide. Suicide. Indignity, injury, suffering, grief, and loss extends within families, across communities and throughout our country. Poverty endures. Children's hopes and futures are sabotaged.

So, who benefits from the status quo? And who decides to keep things the same? We can all stand against violence and abuse from wherever we are in society.

Seeing Possibilities

Our strategic response

Insight Exchange centres on the expertise of people with lived experience of domestic and family violence and gives voice to these experiences. Insight Exchange is designed to inform and strengthen social, service and systemic responses to domestic and family violence.

While we know violence can be committed by anyone, and violence can happen to anyone, violence and abuse is perpetrated at higher rates against some populations and communities.

These communities are sometimes described as 'vulnerable' populations or 'vulnerable people' but our attention must be on how 'vulnerability' is created – through the abuse of power and privilege.

Insight Exchange recognises that forms of discrimination and oppression can compound the adversity, marginalisation and costs to victims of violence.

We acknowledge and remember all First Nations people in Australia and across the world, who are disproportionality subjected to state oppression, racism, colonialism and interpersonal violence including extreme physical violence resulting in harm, injury, disability or death.

Scope of work



When a person reaches out, it may be the first, only or last time they seek support. Everyone's response to violence matters.


Social response continuum

Insight initiatives and *Exchange* initiatives are reported on annually in the Engagement Report ending June each year.

Our strategic approach

Our work centres from and on six key ideas which we draw from the work of Centre for Response-Based Practice:

- 1. ascribing and making meaning
- 2. understanding dignity as central
- 3. clarifying the use of violence involves deliberation
- 4. recognising resistance to violence
- 5. identifying that social responses can help/harm
- 6. and the importance of language

We work to share these ideas broadly across communities, services and systems, and to assist in seeing these ideas applied across the ecosystem.

Insight Exchange has borne the cost of developing digital resources so that any community can access these ideas without cost barriers, and so that individuals can privately access these ideas without having to first access a service or person if they are not safe enough or not wanting to do so.

We have three spheres of work:

- 1. Core published work
- 2. Planned fixed-term work
- 3. Responsive and emerging work

Each sphere of work centres from and serves to fulfil the purpose of Insight Exchange with a deliberate strategy to grow where and how the ideas are understood and applied without growing the cost burden of operating Insight Exchange over time.

Core published work

The publishing of lived experience insights and the development of resources for information and reflection are hosted by Insight Exchange as a cumulative library accessible to any existing or new reader.

As the core work continues and evolves the library grows and/or is refined with new insights and learning.

Planned fixed-term work


Through identified needs/gaps we take work forward to industries, sectors and disciplines – informed by what we learn from lived-experience insights and priorities for change.


1,117 people with lived experience of domestic, family and sexualised violence who shared their insights and/or voiced their feedback into Insight Exchange resources.
